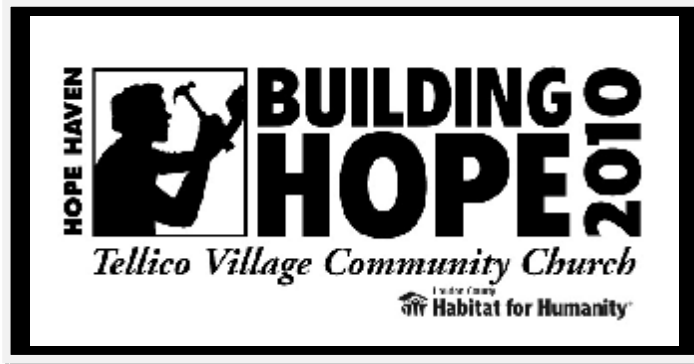

A major Tellico Village Community Church Mission Project for 2010 gets underway in mid March as we begin work on our second Habitat home in Hope Haven. This time we are building a four bedroom home for the Rodriguez family. There has been a good response for volunteers, but it's not too late to add your name to the list. Habitat welcomes everyone regardless of their skill level, so don't hesitate to give it a try. Volunteer forms asking for basic information are available at the church office.

A new method for scheduling volunteers will be in effect this time. Construction dates/type of job and number of persons required will be announced in advance via the Sunday and Wednesday insert and also online. This procedure allows you to choose the dates and jobs for which you will be available. A **hostess** is also needed for each day (follow the same sign up procedure). Hand in the insert slip after any church service or sign up at the church office where dates and jobs will be posted in the loose leaf register. And, if you can't get in, make a call to the church office. **BUT PLEASE SIGN YOURSELVES UP!** You will be helping to make this new system work and also save the committee from making so many calls.

Loudon County Habitat for Humanity has been operating successfully for many years and has a reputation for planning each job carefully with respect to volunteer safety and procedures. To this end Habitat requires that all persons at the jobsite **complete several forms for 2010**. These forms/waivers will be **e-mailed** to you prior to your first day on the job. Please print them and bring them with you. If you don't use e-mail, they can be picked up at the church office. Also included will be Construction Guidelines which will answer all your questions. Unless you are notified in advance, bring your own lunch to the jobsite. Snacks, pop and water will be available. Construction volunteers should be ready to work at 8:30 a.m. and should be finished by or before 3:30 p.m. **If you fail to receive the forms or have other questions, contact Fred Quance (408-2588) or Kay Wilson (458-1599).**

The job of Hostess requires that you be on site by 8:00 a.m. to greet workers, get them signed in and handle a few other duties, after which the hostess is free to leave. The hostess is also required to complete waivers. Job details will be e-mailed, but choose your dates as explained above.

In 2008, our church built its first habitat home in Hope Haven for Jennifer Johnson and her son.

Now is the time for our whole congregation to rally around this mission!

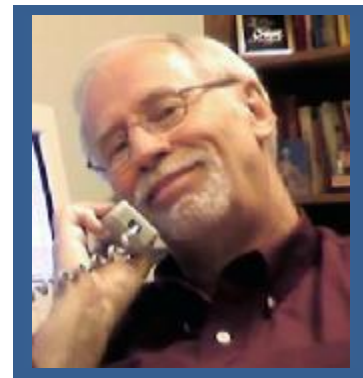

Marty's Statement Concerning the Union Protest

The "Shame on Pastor Singley" campaign currently underway on Highway 444 is a protest by the Southeastern Carpenters Union related to one of the subcontractors awarded a bid on our Sanctuary expansion project. Specifically, the employees of the Wakefield Corporation - one of the largest drywall companies in Knoxville - voted overwhelmingly in 2006 to not join the union. Since that time, union protestors have erected "Shame On..." banners at many job sites where the Wakefield Corporation is working.

The literature handed out by union representatives insinuates that workers on the site may not be paid a livable wage, receive health and pension benefits, and may be undocumented workers.

None of these claims is true. They are designed to create rumor and intimidation.

As a Christian church, we support the right of workers to organize and receive just compensation and benefits. We also support the right of workers to vote against organizing. Just as importantly, we support the right of protestors to protest.

I personally want to appeal to church members and residents of Tellico Village to treat the people attending the sign with respect and Christian love. My understanding is that they are minimum wage temporary workers hired by the union to man the protest stations.

I also want to ask people in our community to be well informed about the facts. An excellent news article about the "Shame" campaign may be found at:

Living Gently In A Violent World

In our recent WednesdayChurch! meetings we have been having some "Conversations By The Fireside" focused on some of the important issues of our lives. Recently, I shared with the group a conversation entitled "Living Gently In A Violent World". A creative title that I lifted from a recent book I read. What follows is an adaptation of that message offered with the hope that we can find a way to make the human journey of life apart from violence. This message was offered prior to the events of recent days at schools in Knoxville, TN and Huntsville AL, but these events magnify the importance of the challenge the message conveys.



Living gently in a violent world is a real challenge when we recognize that in our world today the solution to almost everything we find objectionable is to destroy such. How have we arrived at this place? What are the roots of the problem that causes us to decide to live violently? What solutions are available to us on a personal level that will help us to live gently in the violence around us?

The roots of the problem include:

- The need to be right at all costs. In a culture that awards correctness it is easy to devalue those who do not see things our way and once that is done it is easy to make plans to eliminate the problem.
- The need for things to be purely black or white, right or wrong. The more I look at the world the grayer it becomes but those who are prone to violence do not recognize gray. They want clear pictures and permanent solutions to that which they view as wrong.
- The practice of demonizing and dismissing those with whom we disagree. The violent response calls on us to eliminate the enemy, to view them as less than human, to treat them as a problem to be dealt with.
- The need to impose my personal worldview as the only matrix through which the world may be seen.
- The fear of people and things different from me.

Defining the problem of violence is only half the challenge, the most important thing we can do in the midst of violence is to look for practical solutions. Solutions which though they may not solve the global problems of violence, will at least assure that we do not contribute to their perpetuation or growth. What can we do?

- Learn to listen to others: Even when you disagree with them, you may learn something that will help you grow personally.
- Learn to disagree without being disagreeable: I may not like what you believe but I can and still should like you.
- Recognize that the love of God extends to those with whom you disagree: They are children of God just like you for whom God cares.
- SLOW DOWN: Hurry and anger are not of the devil, they are the devil. They create within us moods of dismissal toward others who do not agree with us. Slowing down will allow us to see those with whom we disagree as people and not just as the ideas and philosophies they represent.
- Hear and live by the words of Paul to the Church at Rome: "Do everything possible on your part to live in peace with everybody." (Romans 12:18, Today's English Version)

My favorite contemporary New Testament scholar is Amy – Jill Levine. Dr. Levine often says of some of the difficult New Testament passages "This text can be read in a harsh way, but it does not have to be". These are wise words also for living in a violent world. We can choose to contribute to and even increase the violence in our world, but we do not have to do so. We can instead work toward living gently in a violent world. May God give us the courage and the grace to make this our goal!

WORK BEGINS ON THE PIPE ORGAN FOR OUR NEW SANCTUARY

With the signing of the contract with Cornel Zimmer Organbuilders of Denver, NC, we are pleased to report that work has begun on the 10 to 12 month project to build and install a quality pipe organ for our new sanctuary. For a project that has been in the works for seven years, this is wonderful news! As many of you know, our organ is based on pipes from an 1862 Henry Erben organ saved by the Organ Historical Society from a church in Brooklyn, NY. These pipes will be attached to new wind chests and mechanisms that control air going into the pipes. So, we will have the unique and beautiful sounds produced by historically interesting pipework controlled by the most technically advanced mechanisms.



Our organ builder is enthusiastic about our project and has gone the extra mile to provide us with an organ that will add a key resource to our music ministry. Not only will Zimmer provide us with an outstanding organ, but they will do so at an affordable price. Zimmer accomplished this by locating other high quality used ranks of pipes that will complement the Erben pipes. These additions will make our organ large enough to both fill our new sanctuary with beautiful music and meet the varied needs of worship requirements such as accompanying the vocal and handbell choirs, leading hymn singing and the various solo roles such as the Prelude, Postlude and recitals. Zimmer is also providing a very high quality used console that has been completely reconditioned and updated to provide the organist with the systems necessary to utilize all resources available in the organ.

As you can see in the picture accompanying this article, Zimmer is already cleaning and restoring the 150 year old pipes. Some pipes had been painted several times and required several attempts to remove the paint. Other pipes only required a basic cleaning to make them shiny. They are very pleased by the results of this initial work.

John Orr, our new Director of Music, is enthusiastic about the new organ and points out that it will have a positive influence during the process to recruit a new organist.

Additional organ updates will be provided in future newsletters. You may express your support of the organ project with your memorial gifts. They may be sent to the attention of Joyce Peterson at the church office.

SHINGLES VACCINE

Shingles is a painful rash (often with blisters) that usually appears on one side of the face or body and usually lasts for 2 or 4 weeks. Its main symptom is pain, which can be severe. Other symptoms can include fever, headache, chills and an upset stomach.

For about one person in five the severe pain can continue even after the rash clears and may last for years. This is called post-herpetic neuralgia.

The same virus that causes chickenpox causes shingles. The virus stays in your body and it can reappear many years later to cause shingles. You can't catch shingles from another person. You can get chickenpox (if you have never had them) from a person with shingles, but this is not very common.

Shingles is more common in people 50 years and older. Each year approximately 1 million people living in the United States get shingles.

The CDC recommends a single dose of shingle vaccine for adults 60 years or older. The vaccine is not a guarantee that you won't get shingles. In clinical trials the vaccine prevented shingles in about half of the people 60 or older. It may also reduce the pain associated with shingles.

A person should not get the vaccine who:

- Has ever had a life threatening allergic reaction to gelatin, the antibiotic neomycin or any other component of the shingles vaccine.
- Has a weakened immune system.
- Has active, untreated tuberculosis.
- Is pregnant or might get pregnant.

Someone with a minor illness, such as a cold, may be vaccinated. Anyone with a temperature over 101 should wait until they recover before getting the vaccine. Always check with your doctor if you are sick.

Check with your insurance company to see if they will cover the vaccine because it is expensive. The vaccine is well worth the money if you are not covered - just ask someone who has had shingles.

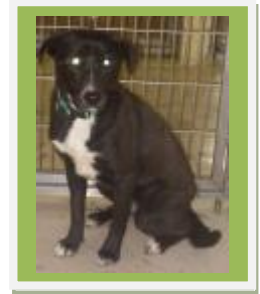
Ongoing Collections
